SEPT. 16 - This is our Neighborhood

Join Pr. Elizabeth and other members of the Adult Forum planning team for reflection about our neighborhood. Who are our neighbors and why is it important to be in relationship with them? We will view a bible study by Bishop Bartholomew of the New Jersey Synod about caring for our neighbors in the name of Jesus. From 12:30 - 1:30, everyone is invited to go and explore the St. Mark's neighborhood with Pr. Elizabeth. We will visit our faith neighbors by walking to Trinity/St. Peter's Episcopal, First Unitarian, Hamilton Baptist, and St. Mary's Cathedral.

SEPT. 23 - This is our Neighborhood

We will learn about the relationship between ELCA and AME (African Methodist Episcopal) churches as described in the congregational resource "Understanding One Another", written and edited by leaders from both churches. This will provide a context for getting to know our neighbor, Bethel AME Church, and we will follow up with a short walk to visit Bethel, leaving after the 11 o'clock service. SEPT. 30 - This is our Neighborhood

ST. MARK'S NEIGHBORHOOD GROUPS ARE LAUNCHED

The Outreach Team of St. Mark's has identified 11 neighborhood groups geographically that are made up of members of the congregation. Each group will have a coordinator or co-coordinators who will encourage members of the group to gather on a regular basis throughout the year. The groups can meet semi-annually, quarterly, monthly, or more frequently, depending upon the desires of the members of each group. These neighborhood groups have been put together for 4 primary purposes:

- To provide a mechanism for members of St. Mark's in a designated geographic area to get together on a regular basis and get to know each other;
- To encourage members in a designated geographic area to pay close attention to other members who might be in need of some care or support;
- To reach out to less active members of St. Mark's and include them in any local events or activities; and
- To encourage members to invite their personal neighbors and friends to any event or activity that their neighborhood group might be doing.

These Neighborhood Groups will create an opportunity for members to get to learn each other by name and face, especially if people within a particular neighborhood group go to the different worship services at St. Mark's. If someone in your neighborhood group experiences a sudden loss, hopefully you might be right there to be of assistance. Inviting less active members or friends to a neighborhood gathering could be a much less threatening way to connect them to St. Mark's than inviting them to come to church on Sunday morning.

The coordinator(s) of each group is not expected to "do it all." They are the ones who have been asked to make sure that the groups gather, but are not expected to host or plan all of the events. Everyone in a neighborhood group is requested to take on this responsibility as you have interest and available time. Some events can be planned in advance, other activities may happen more spontaneously as people decide to go to a movie, take a hike, or have a picnic and want to include other members of their neighborhood group in these outings. Children are a part of every neighborhood group, and members of each group will have to determine how to include children in these gatherings or provide care for them.

As more information is made available about these neighborhood groups, the members of the Outreach Team are ready to support you in any way possible. Also, if any group decides to have a Bible study or topical discussion and would like to have a pastor participate in this study, they are available as resource people. The people on the Outreach Team are Cora Rose, Geri Bailey, Bertie Brouhard, Andrew Sallach, Steve Ernst, and Pr. Ron.

SANCTUARY TASK FORCE

Several months ago, the Social Ministry Team submitted a resolution to the Church Council to establish a Sanctuary Task Force in order to guide the congregation through a process of determining whether or not we might declare ourselves as a Sanctuary Congregation. The Council has now authorized this Task Force to move forward with this process. The members of the Task Force are Mary Ritter (Chair), Cora Rose, Laura Evenson, Kimberly Hamilton, Jason Jennings, and Pastor Ron.

As background to this process, St. Mark's is in a Sanctuary state and a Sanctuary city, and our Sierra Pacific Synod is a Sanctuary Synod. We have a long history of accompanying sisters and brothers at our companion parish in Soyapango, El Salvador, from which many are forced to migrate because of deadly gang violence. We live in a city with many immigrants. One of two immigration courts in the State of California is in San Francisco.

What does Sanctuary look like today? Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity, an interfaith partner in Northern California, tells us that Sanctuary today is: "A public, corporate commitment to walk alongside immigrants, mixed-status families, refugees and other targeted communities to uphold the dignity, due process and full acceptance and participation of all people in our society through protection, support and advocacy."

Congregations can write their own statement of Sanctuary to reflect what specifically they will do. Here are 4 ways congregations are demonstrating their commitment to Sanctuary:

- Advocacy at local, state and national levels for policies to protect immigrants and to address root causes of immigration
- Accompaniment of immigrant families and youth
- Connect with networks of protection and rapid response
- Housing hospitality short term for released detainees, for newly arrived immigrants, or protective housing for someone with a final order of deportation

The Task Force will be doing more research about what being a sanctuary congregation means, consulting with other congregations that already are sanctuary congregations, and establishing a timeline to include the congregation in this deliberation, discernment, and decision. There will be a couple of congregational town meetings during the Education hour on November 11 & 18, and another one in January with the hope that a resolution can be brought before the congregation at the Annual Meeting in January. If you have any comment or input to this process, you may speak with any member of the Task Force.

ST. MARK'S DELEGATION TO CORDERO DE DIOS

Fifteen people from St. Mark's will be traveling to visit the members of our sister congregation, Cordero de Dios, in El Salvador November 19-25. They will continue to nurture the relationships that St. Mark's established with these friends several years ago, and accompany them in their challenges both as individuals and as a congregation. We hold the people of this delegation in our prayers as well as the people of this beloved community of Cordero de Dios as they gather once again to share in this communal exchange.

EN CUENTRO IN EL SALVADOR

Every three years, the Lutheran Church of El Salvador invites its global partners to gather in San Salvador and participate in the discerning process regarding the mission and priorities of the Salvadoran Lutheran Church for the next 3 years. Pastor Ron will be attending this gathering, along with Bishop Mark Holmerud and one other member of our Sierra-Pacific Synod, because St Mark's not only has a relationship with the congregation of Cordero de Dios in San Salvador, but our Synod also has a relationship with the Lutheran Church of El Salvador. El Cuentro will be held November 6-11.

HOLY LAND MINISTRY ASKS: WHAT IN THE WORLD IS HAPPENING OVER THERE??!!

Spring and Summer 2018 have been full of momentous developments in the Holy Land, with appalling consequences for preserving the land of Palestine/Israel as one representing the three major world religions within its borders: Christianity, Judaism and Islam. Israel's military control of Gaza and indeed all of Palestine continues unabated after 70 years since Israel's creation, and Israeli settlements encroach steadily and relentlessly on Palestinian land.

Moving the U.S. Embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem has greatly exacerbated tensions, while Jerusalem's future as a Holy City for all three religions is increasingly and seriously threatened. The Church is called upon - among many other entities - to act now in pursuit of peace and ensure mutual respect for our religious heritages and basic human rights.

What is our role as Christians outside of this troubled Holy Land, the birthplace of our own Christianity? How can we stand with Palestinian Christians there and demonstrate support for our long-time Christian missions of education (several schools and Bethlehem's DAK University), Augusta Victoria Hospital in Jerusalem and refugee relief? Can we stand with Palestinians in their quest for basic human rights? What are Palestinians asking of us? How are their issues and desires similar to ours? At St. Mark's, Holy Land Ministry is offering several opportunities to explore these questions during the coming year.

OCTOBER: Bright Stars of Bethlehem announces "The Jerusalem Conference" in Houston, Texas, on October 11 as part of its annual Palestinian Arts Festival celebrating accomplishments of Dar al-Kalima University's curriculum and programs in Bethlehem, Palestine. The conference will feature prominent religious leaders, including DAK's President Dr.Mitri Raheb, presenting challenging ideas and information about possible actions for Christians in response to current events. Consider attending this stimulating, informative conference and festival!

NOVEMBER: Dr. Mitri Raheb will also speak in the Bay Area at Stanford University on November 14 and at the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley on November 15. If you can't go to Houston, listen to him here!

A Bay Area conference "World Without Walls" will be sponsored by FOSNA (Friends of Sabeel in North America, the Voice of Palestinian Christians.) Though inspired by the many walls built by Israel in Palestine to control and alter the lives of Palestinians - the wall surrounding Bethlehem is a familiar one - this issue and the consequences of walls anywhere has relevance for us in the U.S. and especially California regarding the urgent migration of refugees from Central America. How can the many walls that divide people, real and imagined, be removed so that peoples can live in harmony with one another and recognize our mutual dependence and humanity? More details will be forthcoming.

DECEMBER: Our Adult Forum speakers on December 9 are Gisela and Doug Daetz, who travelled to the Holy Land in Fall of 2017. They will present slides and a discussion of their first-hand experiences in Palestine/Israel.

ON-GOING: Advocacy is vital with our governmental representatives to promote legislation that defends the people of Palestine, as well as our own freedoms and the rights of all people within our care. Remembering that the Holy Family were refugees, having to flee for their lives, we are called also to Welcome and protect the Strangers - the refugees - in our midst. Through the Inter-faith Refugee Welcome Committee and many AMMPARO services and activities St. Mark's coordinates and joins with other like-minded individuals in the Bay Area. Your participation is welcome - in many different ways! (Also see the AMMPARO article in this VOICE.)

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS: SUMMER/FALL 2018

 be removed and read in a more comfortable spot or with a cup of coffee in hand. Please replace when completed.
- We welcomed Bishop Elizabeth Eaton and Pastor Ronald Glusenkamp to our May meeting. They provided us with lively conversation and an update about the ELCA Campaign Always Being Made New and the many lives that are touched by this work. One such highlight is the successful Malaria Campaign and the average donor amount \$8 compounded into millions (\$15 mil). Council provided Bishop Eaton and Pastor Glusenkamp with a check from St. Mark's Congregation, the portion from our Capital Campaign, that was designated for the ELCA Campaign. Bishop Easton and Pastor Glusenkamp wish to thank St. Mark's Congregation for their generous and heartfelt gifts.
- As a result of work with our Governance consultant Dan Hotchkiss and after discussion during the MLT Board and St. Mark's Council joint retreat in the winter, the Council has implemented a consent agenda meeting structure. This meeting structure has contributed to more efficient and in depth Council meetings centered on visioning work for St. Mark's ministries and look to our future. Reports are submitted ahead of time for Council to review and placed in the consent agenda portion of our meetings and approved with one vote. The second portion of our meetings includes discussion items that require more conversation and discernment. Any Council member can move an item to our discussion agenda for more discussion time.
- Council begins our annual planning cycle earlier this year (September versus February in past years). We plan a retreat on 9/21 thru 9/22 to the Mercy Center in Burlingame. During this retreat we will develop 3 annual Ministry Goals and 3 Open Questions. After Council approval at our October meeting, the annual Ministry Goals will be discussed with Ministry team leaders and staff to implement, and will also influence Budget Planning. The Open Questions will guide further visioning work and foster discussion during Council meetings and with the congregation throughout the next year. Our consultant Dan Hotchkiss has met via telephone with the retreat planning committee to build a framework for this important work.
