

In the heart of the Apostle Paul's letter to the Romans, he describes the witness of someone who would be a faithful disciple of Jesus, and includes the instruction, "Extend hospitality to strangers." At St. Mark's, we are taking some major steps in implementing this particular call to discipleship. At the beginning of this year, we voted to be a Sanctuary Congregation. Now, more than ever, that decision has relevance as the threat of ICE raids increases and the venom against immigrants intensifies. We have no idea how this decision will play out, but for the time being we are concentrating on accompanying young immigrants at their court hearings through the Guardian Angel ministry—another way of being a friendly host for those who are strangers in our land.

Of course, our decision to serve as a host to Project Homeless Connect (PHC) in the Urban Life Center is another way that we are extending hospitality to strangers—those who are unhoused and left to fend for themselves on the streets of our city. As we prepare for the beginning of their operation in

September and early October, we will have plenty of opportunities not only to engage in conversation with those who will be knocking at the doors of the ULC, but also to volunteer in support of PHC's many progra12:00 noon.

Following the passage of our resolution to become a Sanctuary Congregation, a member asked me if there was some scriptural basis for this ministry of hospitality and sanctuary that is so much a part of our call as disciples of Jesus Christ and of the Biblical mandate to love our neighbors. When I first came to St. Mark's, I was asked to compile such a document for a synodical AMMPARO workshop. For the remainder of this reflection, I will share a few excerpts from this presentation (all references being from the NRSV).

Leviticus 19:33-34

When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien shall be to you as a citizen among you and you shall love the alien as yourself.

Deuteronomy 27:19

Cursed be anyone who deprives the alien, the orphan, and the widow of justice.

Jeremiah 22:3

Do no wrong or violence to the alien, the orphan, and the widow, or shed innocent blood in this place.

Zechariah 7:9-10

Render true judgments, show kindness and mercy to one another; do not oppress the widow, the orphan, the alien, or the poor; and do not devise evil in your hearts against one another.

Hebrews 13:2

Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing so some have entertained angels without know it."

Matthew 25:35

Jesus said, "I was a stranger and you welcomed ME."

We have been blessed to have this opportunity to extend the hospitality of our congregation to the strangers in our midst just as we have the opportunity every Sunday to extend our hospitality to the people who enter our sanctuary and who are looking for a receptive welcome, a friendly smile, and an intentional recognition of their presence.


SANCTUARY—MEMBERS OF ST. MARK'S SANCTUARY TEAM

There will be a simple meal provided, a glass of wine or beer or non-alcoholic options. Following dinner we will listen to a short presentation to fuel our discussion afterwards.





PROJECT HOMELESS CONNECT

Project Homeless Connect (PHC) is moving into the Urban Life Center on St. Mark's Square during the months of August and September, and will be fully operational by the beginning of October. The mission of Project Homeless Connect (PHC) is to connect people of San Francisco with the care that they need to move forward in life, to offer basic resources to meet these needs, to provide immediate supportive services, and to be a resource to the entire community. They offer these basic services by appointment two mornings/ week, and one day/month they provide optical care, hearing screening, and dental care in the auditorium of the ULC. One day/week, PHC also provides these basic services at other locations throughout the city.

PHC will be having a "Get To Know Our Neighbor" Day of Service on Monday, September 16, 10:00 – 12:00 Noon at which the staff of PHC will officially introduce their organization to the community and volunteers will be able to pack healthy lunches and hygiene kits for participants in the program to receive the next day. Space is limited, so you will need to register at https://gettoknowphc.eventbrite.com. If you are not able to attend this "grand opening," people will have plenty of opportunities to volunteer with PHC in the future because their programs are greatly dependent upon the volunteers who provide many of the resources for the unhoused and at-rick people in our city.

LUTHERAN OFFICE OF PUBLIC POLICY (LOPP) HAS A NEW DIRECTOR!

Regina Banks is the new Director of LOPP California. LOPP is one of four public policy offices of ELCA Advocacy. LOPP-California primarily advocates for state and local issues. Ms. Banks has been director of LOPP California since January 2019. She and her Board have established 3 advocacy priorities for the year:

- 1. Water justice
- 2. Immigration, especially issues of healthcare for immigrants
- 3. Ending child poverty

Ms. Banks is visiting congregations around California to acquaint them with LOPP and to assist them with organization, advocacy, and building relationships with policy makers in their areas. She coordinated a very successful Lutheran Lobby Day at the California legislature in May 2019 - over 100 Lutherans from around the state visited their legislators in Sacramento to advocate for water justice, immigration issues, and the end of childhood poverty. She had told the legislators, "The Lutherans are coming.", and they did!

Then at the end of September or early October, those who are interested will get together and try to decide on a week next summer that most people could participate in this congregational retreat.

Holden Village allows a church group to bring 15-40 people to the Village for a minimum of 5 nights. Therefore, we would have space for only 40 people, including children for whatever week we chose. Everybody in the group would have to arrive at the Village and leave the Village on the same days. It is preferable to go into the Village on a Sunday and leave on a Friday or Saturday. Pastor Ron would handle the reservations for the group at the Village and everyone would be on their own to decide how to get there. The cost for a group (2019 rates) is \$76/adult/night and \$56/child (6-17)/night. Round trip on the slower boat (Lady of the Lake) up Lake Chelan is \$35.75/adult. Parking at Field's Point Landing is \$35/week. Please let Pastor Ron know of your interest if you would like to participate in this adventure, (no commitment at this time until we decide on the date).



AIDS WALK SAN FRANCISCO

On Sunday, July 14, Dana Utz took part in the 33rd annual AIDS Walk San Francisco (AWSF) representing St. Mark's Lutheran Church. And, thanks in large part to generous support by members of the congregation, Dana raised \$2,265.00 to benefit Bay Area AIDS service organizations!

The AWSF event, held in Golden Gate Park as a 10-kilometer walk and rally, advocates for the rights of people living with HIV/AIDS, confronts homelessness, helps feed people in need, and protects the health and dignity of all members of the community. This year 186 teams of walkers, individuals, and virtual walkers like myself raised over \$1,311,000 to benefit PRC (formerly Positive Resource Center), Project Open Hand, and the POP-UP Clinic at Ward 86, as well as dozens of other Bay Area HIV/AIDS service organizations.

AWSF was founded in 1987 by Craig R. Miller and his organization MZA Events. Over the past 33 years it has raised more than \$90 million for lifesaving HIV prevention, testing, and care programs and services in the Bay Area. And, members of St. Mark's have participated in this important cause since the beginning as walkers and donors.

NORTHERN EUROPEAN CHORAL MUSIC AT ST. MARK'S LUTHERAN CHURCH WITH THE MARIGALCHOR KIEL, PROFESSOR FRIEDERIKE WIEBKEN, DIRECTOR - SUNDAY, OCTOBER 6, 2:00PM

The Madrigalchor Kiel (Germany) is visiting the San Francisco Bay Area from October 3 - October 11, 2019, to perform a series of choral concerts within the framework of the San Francisco—Kiel Sister City Partnership. On Sunday, October 6, at 2:00 pm they will be giving a concert at st. Mark's.

The music exchange between San Francisco and Kiel within this framework was inaugurated by St. Mark's Lutheran Director of Music, Dr. Timothy Zerlang, when he accepted the invitation by Kiel's City Hall (the first step in this music connection) and performed an organ recital at the St. Nikolai Church in Kiel on September 8, 2018. The Marigalchor visit is the second step, whereby the music connection becomes a music exchange.

San Francisco's citizen-driven sister city partnership with Kiel, the northernmost German port city on the shores of the Baltic Sea, was formally established by the Mayors of both cities in September 2017 for the purpose of connecting people and organizations, and promoting understanding and cooperation in a variety of subjects such as Civil Engagement, Education, Science, Art, Environment, etc. On the San Francisco side, the partnership is served by the San Francisco—Kiel Sister City Committee, founded and registered as a 501c3 corporation in November 2016. This Committee consists of all volunteer facilitators and promoters of the partnership between the two cities. All operations depend on donations.

The Madrigalchor Kiel does not restrict its concerts to Kiel and surrounding area or to the classical interpretation of madrigals. The ensemble is known far beyond its borders for its high-class performance of many types of choral music. The singers of the choir under their director Friederike Woebcken like to discover and explore the multi-faceted soundscapes of polyphonic Scandinavian vocal works to make them known to their local audiences and to introduce them to the world when on their travels. Since its foundation in 1990, the choir has accepted invitations from numerous countries around the world, including the USA, Japan and South Africa. In 2015, it was a guest at the International Choir Festival in Tolosa (Spain).

The choir also frequently returns to its musical roots in Scandinavia, with many concert tours throughout Denmark, Sweden, Norway and Iceland. However, its affinity to Scandinavia is not just through its music. The Madrigalchor Kiel is grateful for the friendship they had with Eric Ericson, the Swedish choir maestro. In 2006 and 2007 Ericson worked on a Scandinavian repertoire with the choir which was presented in two concerts in Schleswig-Holstein.

Apart from North European a-cappella music the choir also dedicates itself to oratorical projects. Consequently, the works of Bach, Brahms, Händel or Rossini are part of its continually expanding repertoire. This wide range can be heard on the audio CDs of the choir, recently as a double live CD "20 Jahre Madrigalchor Kiel" and the CD "Bewegtes Lauschen" that appeared in 2016, or in frequent concerts throughout the world. And of course also those in Kiel.





ACTIONS OF THE ELCA NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America held its triennial assembly during the week of August 6 – 10. Here is a summary of some of the major decisions and actions that took place during that week:

- Re-elected Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton to a second six-year term.
- Issued a declaration of apology to our siblings of African descent, which was received by the African Descent Lutheran Association with thanks and a call for accountability and living into the words shared.
- Approved a resolution declaring the ELCA to be a "sanctuary church body," encouraging participation in the ELCA AMMPARO initiative for migrant children, discernment of care for our immigrant neighbors in our context, and the promise of forthcoming resources for this work.
- Approved support for the World Council of Church's Thursdays in Black, awareness movement for a world without rape and violence.
- Voted to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance, in honor and remembrance of the martyrdom of the Emanuel 9.
- Approved a declaration for inter-religious commitment, reaffirming ecumenical and interfaith partnerships.
- Approved the recommendations from a strategic task force which has been studying how to work toward authentic diversity in our church.
- Approved memorials: affirming but not "endorsing" the Poor People's Campaign, care for immigrants and refugees, and other statements.
- Adopted a new social statement, "Faith, Sexism, and Justice: a Lutheran Call to Action," and its implementing resolutions.
- Elected Deacon Sue Rothmeyer as the Churchwide Secretary, a full-time position which acts as executive administrator and leader on all constitutional matters and interpretation.
- Passed a Constitutional change for Deacons (rostered ministers of word and service) to be ordained, from the previous practice of consecration.
- Celebrated the milestones of 50 years of women's ordination, 40 years since the first woman of color was ordained, and 10 years since full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ clergy.
