# ELCA Churchwide Assembly A passion for grace and a commitment to justice Pastor Elizabeth's reflections

As pastor, parent, spouse, global citizen and ELCA Church Council member, I was inspired by the actions of our church to protect the planet. As someone who has witnessed the yearning for peace and justice in the Holy Land, it was heartening to see the potential for action that might positively affect the lives of Palestinians and Israelis. As a person born into white privilege, I was moved by Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's words to us, "We know that it exists, and our eyes are open, we are complicit if we don't do something to change laws and attitudes so that there is a level playing field in this country and so there is liberty and justice for all."

We are Lutheran Christians whose lives are reformed by Word and Sacrament and the cross of Jesus Christ. We gather weekly to be "refueled" by worship and one another in order to go back out into the world to live as God's faithful disciples.

During the Churchwide Assembly, we worshiped every-day – it was fantastic! We were led by Jazz and Dixieland band musicians for some of the services; on other days, we heard the voices of a local gospel choir and the National Lutheran Choir. One lively worship service featured Cajun music! We prayed and worshiped first and then we moved into action as the church.

There is a lot on our plate that God is calling us to do. Almost too much...
I'm clear about what to do first and I invite you to join me.
Before we go and do, let us worship first, be fed at the table first, pray and listen to the Holy Spirit, first.

Then, all of our doing in the name of Christ can be become our true joy. See you in worship.

# St. Mark's Adult Forum Kickoff on Sunday October 16 & 23 with Dr. Barbara Pitkin of Stanford University

Barbara Pitkin specializes in the history of Christian thought, with a particular emphasis on the religious developments in late medieval and early modern Europe. She received her B.A. in German language and literature from Carleton College and her M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Chicago Divinity School. Dr. Pitkin teaches courses on the history and future of Christianity, sixteenth-century reformations, the history of biblical interpretation, and women and religion. She also serves as the faculty / grad colloquium coordinator and supervises undergraduate outreach and research for the Department of Religious Studies.

## OCTOBER 16

She will talk about the 95 Theses in the context of late medieval Christianity. In 2017, Lutherans and others will mark the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's 95 Theses. What did Luther hope to achieve by drawing up the 95 Theses and how did his aims fit within the context of Christianity at the time? How did this event come to be understood as the birth of the Reformation?

## OCTOBER 23

She will widen the scope and talk about the Reformation as more than Luther. Even though many of Luther's contemporaries—both supporters and critics—identified Luther as the Reformation's first champion (or heretic, depending on your point of view), the movements for religious reform that sprang up across Europe and England had their own local and unique points of origin. Who were some of these other Reformers and how did these men (and, occaionally, women) contribute to the massive changes to Western Christianity 500 years ago?


# FLOORING, ELEVATOR & WINDOW UPDATE

The F.E.W. (Floors, Elevator and Windows) Committee is pleased to share the latest news about the three projects that St. Mark's approved at the Annual Congregational Meeting earlier this year.

#### **NEW WOOD FLOORING**

As recommended by the F.E.W. Committee, the Church Council has approved the installation of new wood flooring at the nave and chancel. In January, the congregation approved installing new wood floors at both the main level and the balcony and the Committee and Council have endeavored to realize this goal, but the final cost of the total project – nave, chancel and balcony floors – would have exceeded the budgeted amount of \$380,000 by more than 40%. Limiting the flooring scope to the main level will allow us to work within the approved budget and concentrate our efforts on the areas that are most seen and experienced by the congregation and general public. Plant Construction is now working in the church building to complete the project in October, allowing us to return to our historic building by Reformation Sunday.

The budget and the bid results have allowed us to include an alternate design that was first considered over 15 years ago (see sketch): extending the central portion of the chancel platform forward by approximately five feet and gently curving the central two-thirds of the chancel steps to parallel the pew curvature. This change will have multiple benefits:




- The arc-shaped steps and chancel area will enhance the unique curvilinear nature of our historic building
- Musical groups will have a larger performance area and will not need to bring in stage extensions that could damage the new wood flooring

Thanks to Marisa Louie and the many volunteers who helped us move temporarily from the church building to the Urban Life Center for worship while the new flooring is installed. While Plant is working in the Sanctuary, Cal and Gail Culp are taking this opportunity to touch up the paint on the pews that are now stored

in Heritage Hall. Thank you Gail and Cal!

#### ART GLASS WINDOW RESTORATION

This project, coordinated by Jeremy McClain, continues to move steadily ahead with stunning results! The artisans at Hyland Studio have methodically removed one window at a time, transporting each window to their shop in Santa Clara where they clean and repair the glass; replace the lead strips and then reinstall the restored window at its original location. While the flooring project is in progress, Hyland Studio has removed the southeast and southwest windows at the chancel, the two most visible windows in the Sanctuary. They plan to reinstall those restored windows when the flooring is complete, thereby maintaining the beautiful appearance of the chancel area for worship, concerts and weddings when we return to the building.



#### **ELEVATOR ADDITION**

In May, we reported that the San Francisco Planning Department's Historic Preservation Commission had approved the design of St. Mark's elevator addition. This was a major milestone! Architectural Resources Group (ARG) has moved ahead with the preparation of construction documents for the project and submitted drawings to the Department of Building Inspection (DBI). With so much construction in the city, DBI's review could take several weeks – or months – to complete. Given this schedule, starting the project shortly after Easter (April 16, 2017) will allow adequate time to secure the building permit, finalize contracts and give the builders advance time to order long-lead products like the elevator.

# PARTNERSHIP STORIES FROM THE SIERRA PACIFIC SYNOD

Here is a story about some productive and delight-full partnerships. It is a good story, as partnership stories usually are. And your congregation is or could be part of the story.

In the summer of 2009 the Word and Sacrament Discipling Team (part of our synod's volunteer structure) invited congregations to a training workshop on the catechumenate at the San Damiano Retreat Center in Alamo, CA. An ancient process for preparing candidates for baptism and integrating new converts into the congregation, the catechumenate process has been in recent years adopted by many Lutheran congregations, perhaps because it is an appropriately Lutheran way of doing effective evangelism. Leadership and resources for the 3 day event came from several congregations already utilizing this process: St. Timothy, Monterey (Pr. Clark Brown was the coordinator); St. Mark's, San Francisco; and Bethlehem, Auburn. Former Bishop David Mullen, a key proponent of the catechumenate process, also participated. "Learner" congregations paid a fee to participate, but other costs were covered by the Discipling Team which, in turn, was funded by the mission support gifts congregations share with the synod. So there's a good chance your congregation is part of this partnership story!

Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Reno, one of the "learner" congregations, sent a pastor and three lay leaders to the event. They learned much, and returned home eager to develop this ministry in their congregation. First came a year of preparation. The catechumentate is a thorough process, involving almost weekly gatherings for 4-6 months, meals (usually) each time, four distinct "stages," a sponsor for each candidate, and several public liturgies to celebrate the candidates and mark their progress on the journey. A year of preparation is, therefore, necessary. Each congregation adapts and modifies the process to fit its own culture and context. Good Shepherd calls its process "Journey with Christ," initially meeting Sunday mornings but later moving to Sunday evenings for 2 hour sessions that included a light dinner. Each session also includes a brief large group teaching time, more time in small groups for personal reflection on a Bible reading assigned for the week, and one-on-one time for candidate and sponsor to share and pray together.

The best part of Good Shepherd's story is the impact this process has had on candidates, sponsors, and leaders. Listen to this sampling of testimonials.

Most important to me was the sense of community, being close to everyone and knowing that we all were sharing a part of ourselves on our journey to find our

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place with Christ. We have created bonds with each other that have brought deep friendship and love for one another. (Former candidate, current leader)

I was delighted to discover that someone, and actually many people, cared about my faith and were willing to help it grow. Together we studied the Bible. They listened as I shared my doubts and joys, helped me meet others from the congregation, prayed with me and for me, and helped me learn. That all mattered so much more to me than just going to church on Sunday and having people say, "It"s so nice to see you here." (Former candidate)

The Bible study is the key to the spiritual part of the process. It is amazing to see the text in a new light, as other journeyers may have completely different interpretations of the passage. If you have an open mind it is very enlightening. (Former candidate, current leader.)

The process builds a strong foundation in faith for people new or returning to the church. It makes you feel connected to the congregation; if you make a 6-8 month commitment to the process, you are going to be invested in the community. (Former candidate, current leader.)

After going through the process I care so much more about my church. I participate more and serve as a leader, and I love doing it! (Former candidate, current leader)

I want to say how incredibly grateful I am to have been a part of this process. It truly changed my life. (Former leader, on original team)

This process is an appropriately Lutheran way of doing evangelism: not knocking on doors, but worshiping, learning, and serving together. Over time congregation members learn that they are inviting a friend not just to a worship service, but also to the possibility of participating in this process.

Too many well-intentioned congregations try to attract new people, "seekers," by tinkering with worship music, but have no plan for what to do with those people if they do show up. How will we help them learn faith basics? Grow in faith? Be integrated into the congregation? No idea! The catechumenate process facilitates a productive and delight-full partnership between congregation and those new to the church, creating many new, good partnership stories.

"If you build it, they will come," for this is also a partnership with God the Holy Spirit, who calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies the church.

# **Update from the Call Committee:**

In the last issue of The Voice, you were introduced to the Patels—Ravi searching for a life partner as his sister, Geeta, camera in hand, probes his thoughts on his place in the world, his inherited culture, and his future hopes. After Ravi flops at dating, his parents become matchmakers, creating a "bio-data" sheet to be faxed near and far.

Like Ravi, St. Mark's is searching for a partner, not a life partner but a partner in ministry. Our "bio-data" is the Ministry Site Profile (MSP), which puts to paper who we are and who we hope to become, including congregation and community demographics, our gifts, and the challenges we perceive in living out our vision for God's future. The MSP describes the ministry partner we seek—someone who will help us become better ministers to our neighbors near and far; someone who will work with us to enhance our ministry to children, youth, and families; someone who embodies joy and a passion for the gospel.

The Ministry Site Profile has gone near and far through the Sierra Pacific Synod, our companion in calling an associate pastor. The Synod is sending Rostered Leader Profiles, "bio-data" sheets from those interested in learning more about us and exploring joining us in ministry. Through the power of Skype, the Call Committee is interviewing fascinating people, listening carefully and discerning the tug of the Spirit.

As St. Mark's seeks a ministry partner, author Frederick Buechner reminds us that: "The first ministers were the twelve disciples. There is no evidence that Jesus chose them because they were brighter or nicer than other people. In fact the New Testament record suggests that they were continually missing the point, jockeying for position and, when the chips were down, interested in nothing so much as saving their own skins. Their sole qualification seems to have been their initial willingness to rise to their feet when Jesus said, 'Follow me.'"

We ask for your prayers as we discern where the Spirit is urging us as St. Mark's seeks a leader who will respond—and help us to respond—to Jesus' call to "follow," moving off the Square into the community in which God has planted us.

Pray about our journey into God's future, discerning what it means to follow. Talk to your Call Committee—Gretchen Armstrong, Pr. Elizabeth Ekdale, Laura Evenson, Philip Krikau, Margaret McLean, Cora Rose, Andrew Sallach and Greg Jahnke.

# St. Mark's Knitting Ministry

Even though, it is still summer, they asked for them as the temperature drops in the evening. Burrito dinners, blankets and water were all distributed. This maybe short-term help, but the people we encountered expressed thanks with a smile. We continue to pray for them as we also receive their gift of resilience in life.

Violence, poverty, and economic hardship are every day issues for our brothers and sisters in El Salvador and elsewhere in Central America and Mexico. In 2012 and 2013, we heard heart-wrenching stories about migrants, including unaccompanied children and families, making the dangerous trip north to escape the violence, only to be held in miserable detention centers and often deported to the danger they had just left. Many of those immigrants were brought to detention centers in California.

The ELCA Churchwide Assembly in August 2016 has voted overwhelmingly to support the AMMPARO Initiative – Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities. The Sierra Pacific Synod Global Mission Advocacy Team (GMAT) is now working with other Bay Area organizations to establish a network of Welcoming Congregations – congregations which make a commitment to welcome and minister to migrant guests in the community.

Becoming a Welcoming Congregation does not require a commitment by the whole congregation but rather a commitment by the pastor and a small team of members. Welcoming Congregations are not necessarily offering shelter or employment but merely are willing to be a church home for migrant children and families in the same way that congregations of several generations ago welcomed Lutheran migrants from Europe and helped them navigate life in their new home. An accompaniment team might be five people including at least one Spanish speaker who make a 6-12 month commitment to meet a migrant child or family, and support them in a variety of ways, including having dinner with them once a month, and phoning or texting them weekly.

We want you to consider joining the AMMPARO Initiative www.elca.org/AMMPARO and help in any of the following ways:

- I. Become a Welcoming Congregation.
- 2. Seek housing for migrants, including transitional housing for newly arrived immigrants.
- 3. Provide courtroom accompaniment at Immigration Court in San Francisco for the day. Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity in Oakland does this with volunteers. In the ELCA Southwest California Synod, the "Guardian Angel" program does this work with "Dreamers", students who are immigrants meeting qualifications for U.S. residence and are very aware of the issues faced by their migrant clients. Stories abound about the positive response in the courtroom when there is an advocate for the immigrant, even if they are not a lawyer or even a Spanish speaker!
- 4. Coordinate the "post-release from detention". A coordinator is notified when a person will be released from a local detention center, and then works with the detainee's family to pick up the newly released migrant, feed them, and possibly give them what they might need, such as a backpack of supplies if they must travel out of the area to family.
- 5. Advocate for public policy that will positively impact the current immigration crisis.

# **CAPITAL CAMPAIGN** PLEDGE UPDATE

Pledges/Gifts/Bequest \$1,045,359

Amount Received To-Date Campaign Pledge Status \$446,861

Ahead of schedule

Last year the congregation approved a capital campaign to raise funds for three projects: (1) the installation of an elevator in the church building, (2) the repair and restoration of stained glass windows in the sanctuary, and (3) the installation of new hardwood flooring in the sanctuary. We are now able to mark a significant milestone in this much anticipated project as work crews have begun the installation of new hardwood flooring in the sanctuary.

Our Capital Campaign Committee intends to provide quarterly updates on the status of campaign pledging, beginning with this report. As can be seen from the numbers listed above, pledge amounts received, as of July 31, 2016, have been significant. During the fall pledge drive the Capital Campaign Committee encouraged leaders within our community of faith to step forward with their pledges and demonstrate their commitment to the project. Many members responded in a very significant manner. We would like to highlight the board members of MLT in particular, and thank them for MLT's very generous pledge of \$250,000. Thank you!

And thank you also to all of the members and friends of St. Marks who have made a personal pledge of support to this worthwhile project. Your pledge of support makes this project a reality.

If you have not already made a pledge to the Capital Campaign, our committee would encourage you to prayerfully consider doing so. # PALESTINIAN CHRISTIANS GARNER STRONG SUPPORT AT ELCA ASSEMBLY

Voting members, both lay and clergy from ELCA churches nation-wide gathered at the tri-annual ELCA ASSEMBLY in New Orleans in August and took a bold stance, voting overwhelmingly (82%) to actively support Palestinian Christians in their struggles for justice, peace and human rights in the occupied Holy Land.

[NOTE: On the next page of the VOICE, you can read a complete report of actions taken by that ELCA Assembly. Here, we report on how St. Mark's is developing programs to follow up on these commitments that were made by our ELCA Assembly to stand for justice in the Holy Land.]

ST. MARK'S IS RESPONDING to these challenges! A special project is coming to St. Mark's during Advent: We are partnering with Bright Stars of Bethlehem and other Bay Area churches to sponsor a photography competition at the Lutheran Dar Al-Kalima (DAK) College of Arts and Culture in Bethlehem. St. Mark's will host this special exhibit in Heritage Hall throughout December, offering an appropriate, thought-provoking setting for our Advent focus on the significance of Christmas.

"Humans of Palestine" will feature students' photos depicting Palestinians' daily lives as they cope with military occupation and the Separation Wall. Through their creativity, these young Palestinian photography students aim to humanize the image of their people and life through their art. We hope it will also stimulate scholarship donations to the College, founded by Lutheran Pastor Mitri Raheb after Israelis constructed the Wall surrounding Bethlehem. This innovative college educates and empowers youth in Bethlehem (both Christian and Moslems) to be tolerant, creative citizens who contribute positively toward a more peaceful society and world. # 2016 ELCA CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY AND GRACE GATHERING

The triennial Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America and the in-augural Grace Gathering were convened in New Orleans the week of August 8-13, 2016 at the Ernest N. Morial Convention Center. Pastor Ekdale, Pastor Jim DeLange, St. Mark's Director of Music Tim Zerlang, Ed Chitty and Jeremy McClain from St. Mark's attended.

#### **WORSHIP**

Assembly and Grace Gathering attendees worshipped together daily. Styles of music varied from traditional to Dixieland to Gospel, displaying the wide diversity of liturgical expression with the ELCA. Each renewed the many individuals into a single body of Christ brought together to do the Church's work.

#### A NEW VICE PRESIDENT

William B. Home II of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Clearwater, FL, was elected vice president of the ELCA by the assembly and installed during the closing worship. The position of vice president is the highest a layperson can hold in the ELCA.

#### LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS

Being the highest legislative authority of the ELCA, much of the assembly's time was spent on measures setting the church's stance on well over 100 social justice, diversity, environmental and church administration issues. A summary of the legislative actions is provided on <u>St. Mark's Website</u> along with the complete Legislative Update from the assembly.

#### **GRACE GATHERING**

Grace Gathering was an opportunity to prepare for observances of the 500th anniversary of the Reforma-

tion, reflect on how the Reformation can guide us today. Workshops separate from the Churchwide Assembly were presented August 10-12, considering the commemoration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation and exploring issues ranging from interfaith and ecu-menical relationships, diversity within the ELCA, the future of the ELCA, Social Ministry and Jus-tice, Music and the Arts. Grace Gathering attendees also participated in daily worship and As-sembly plenary sessions.

Keynote Address: Leymah Gbowee Nobel Peace laureate Leymah Gbowee, who led Women of Liberia Mass Action for Peace help-ing end the Second Liberian Civil War, addressed the combined Assembly and Grace Gathering. Her story of daring to be "a troublemaker" challenged all to step forward and speak out when-ever and wherever injustice is found.

# David Yearsly's recital at St. Mark's Saturday, November 12, at 7 pm

J. S. Bach was the greatest organist of his or any other age. He also trained all of his sons in the art of playing the King of Instruments. This program brings together music by four Bach brothers — Wilhelm Friedemann, Carl Philipp Emanuel, Johann Christoph Friedrich, and Johan Christian—and frames them with a towering Prelude and Fugue of their mighty father.

David Yearsley was educated at Harvard College and Stanford University, where he received his Ph.D. in music history. He is author of the widely-praised Bach and the Meanings of Counterpoint (Cambridge, 2002) and Bach's Feet: The Organ Pedals in European Culture (Cambridge, 2012), which received the Ogasapian Book Award from the Organ Historical Society. Among his honors as an organist are all major prizes at the Bruges Early Music Festival. He has been an Alexander von Humboldt Foundation Fellow at the Humboldt University in Berlin, a Wenner-Gren Foundation Fellow at the University of Gothenburg, and recipient of an American Council of Learned Societies Fellowship. His recordings include a double-CD album of J. S. Bach's organ trio sonatas and Songs and Sonatas from Baroque London (with Martin Davids), both on the Musica Omnia label. Mr. Yearsley has been music critic for the Anderson Valley Advertiser for more than a quarter century; his weekly column can also be read at counterpunch.org. A long-time member of the pioneering synthesizer trio Mother Mallard's Portable Masterpiece Company, he teaches at Cornell University.

In 2015 Jonathan Rundman released a new album titled LOOK UP. It marks a mature new phase in Jonathan's critically acclaimed discography. These ten songs explore themes of technology, linear time, and optimism, and draw from Rundman's diverse musical influences including Americana, Nordic folk music, and '80s New Wave pop.
