

REMEMBERING THE REFORMATION ON THE TAYLOR AND BOODY ORGAN EVERY SUNDAY IN OCTOBER

"We All Believe in One True God" (Wir glauben all an einen Gott), one of the great contributions to the musical heritage of the Reformation by Martin Luther will be the focus of the organ Postlude during the Month of October. Leading up to our Reformation commemoration on Sunday, October 29, I plan to play settings of this great chorale by some of the masters of the North German organ tradition of the 17th & 18th centuries, paired with works by two of my favorite composers for the organ: J. S. Bach and Dietrich Buxtehude. Please feel free to remain seated if you wish for

these slightly-extended postludes, somewhat similar to short recitals that often follow services in German

churches.

ST. MARK'S HOSTS REFUGEE EVENT

On June 21, 2017 St. Mark's hosted a well-attended interfaith event on Helping Refugees Today: What We Need To Know, What We Need To Do. During the session we heard from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service, explaining refugee processing procedures, and from International Rescue Committee and Jewish Family & Community Services, explaining how these two refugee resettlement agencies meet and accompany refugees arriving in the United States. While the refugee status and resettlement process is different from the asylum status that unaccompanied minors seek when crossing the border, we learned that the standard used by the government and court system, of fleeing from violence and persecution, is largely the same.

INTERFAITH DETENTION CENTER VIGIL

Can you show up to pray, witness to your faith with others, and give hope to detained migrants? You are invited for a "field trip" opportunity at the monthly ecumenical immigration detention center vigil! This vigil is held for an hour on the first Saturday of the month.

Description:

One participant from St. Mark's described the vigil as follows: "Amazing experience! I hope to go again next month... It is a large circle of people, maybe 50 last time, some holding signs, a speaker at a microphone talking about their issues and issues related to local detainees... Then questions and comments from people around the circle, then prayer requests and communal prayer by the leader and Pastor Deborah, and then finally a "moment of noise" with hooting and hollering and noisemakers, loud enough so the detainees inside can hear us and know we are there."

ELEVATOR PROJECT UPDATE

This fall, we will see the completion of the elevator project at St. Mark's! The project broke ground in April and has had a slow start, but Plant Construction, Architectural Resources Group and the FEW (Flooring, Elevator & Windows) Committee have collaborated these past months to initiate the project, get necessary Planning Commission approvals and review the drawings and details needed to fabricate the elevator and the project's many components. During this time, the construction team has completed many preparatory tasks such as pouring the concrete foundation and setting steel anchor bolts; modifying the balcony doors to accommodate new power-assisted door operators; refinished the main entry doors and installed new hardware; and framed the partitions for the new elevator equipment room opposite the Men's Restroom entry.

As the project swings back into full gear in the coming weeks and months, we expect the following progress:

- Mid-August: A crane will install the steel structural frame for the elevator addition.
- Mid-August Mid-September: Workers will frame the exterior walls, sheath the walls and install windows at the three elevator lobbies (one on each floor level).
- Mid-September Mid-October: Plant will install the elevator equipment and car; complete electrical and life safety systems; roof the addition; and apply the exterior plaster base and parge coats. During this month, Plant will also install the joint covers between the new addition and the existing historic structure. The new addition is designed as a self-supporting structure that can move independently of the church building during an earthquake.
- October: Carpenters and painters will complete the interior finishes and masons will apply the brick finish to the exterior walls. With the exterior complete, Plant will remove the exterior scaffolding and install a new decorative iron fence on the north side of the addition.

If all goes according to schedule, the elevator will be finished just in time for our commemoration of the 500th Anniversary of the beginning of the German Reformation, but we all know that construction projects can often take longer than expected. Whatever the conditions, you can rest assured that St. Mark's will not sell indulgences to accelerate the completion of this long-awaited project!

FOOD PANTRY: OUTSIDE THE ROUTINE

When I consider the story of the Good Samaritan, I am reminded that all people need the loving care of food, shelter, and rescue from harm, and that sometimes this loving care is an act which is completely outside the caregiver's daily routine. I like to get outside of my daily routine once a month on Saturday mornings by working with the Interfaith Food Pantry at Old First Presbyterian Church where it's fun to watch Dave and Vik vie for who is the strongest as they heft bags of potatoes and carrots, and to compete with Michael, Jessie, and Maryann as they do the mental math in dividing up the food so that everyone gets a share of the food without having any food left over at the end of the morning.

It's always gratifying to see the smile on little Titus's face when his Dad hands him a flat of strawberries and asks for his help in sliding it into the distribution room, or to watch little Imogen wave the flag to direct the next group into the receiving line and bring a smile to an elderly lady's face. As the people go through the line, I like to learn to speak phrases in their language and give people a chance to practice their English with me. Looking into their faces as they open their bags, receive the food, and express smiling appreciation definitely is a plus.

Getting rid of empty boxes is a big part of Food Pantry day as they are hauled into the kitchen where they are cut up for recycling while music plays in the background. After all of the food has been distributed to the 325 patrons, it is time to clean up. As I go back to pick up my car at the Old First Church garage, I sometimes give the valet a special treat from the morning's distribution before taking off for lunch.

I like this way of giving loving care to others. The SF/Marin Food Bank does a great job in facilitating this ministry. They drop off the food, handle all of the patron ID cards, and support the volunteers in this way. This organization has won awards for its extensive, sustained outreach to feed hungry people over a wide geographic area, across diverse neighborhoods. Their greatest need is people-power.

St. Mark's contribution to this ministry is to pay for 25% of the year's supply of weekly food to 325 patrons. Three other churches share the remaining 75% of the cost: The First Unitarian Universalist Church, Calvary Presbyterian Church, and St. Luke's Episcopal Church. Along with the host site, Old First Presbyterian Church, we all take turns in being the primary host for the Interfaith Food Pantry throughout the year.

Our St. Mark's pantry volunteers number @ 25 and like to divide our Saturday mornings into 3 shifts:

7:30 – 9:00 AM Unload the palettes of food into the distribution room 9:00 – 10:30AM Distribute the food to patrons in six 15-minute shifts

10:30 – 11:00AM Clean up

We always are in need of more volunteers, especially for the clean-up. People of all ages, including children, are welcome to participate. No one is denied the opportunity to help. If you would like to help, contact me or look for me at the 11:00AM service, and I will put you on a monthly notification list to invite you to sign up for the next distribution date—which is October 21 and December 2 of this year.

HOW THE JESSIE AND MICHAEL PEIRCE FOUND ST. MARK'S

We came to St. Mark's shortly after moving to San Francisco from Texas for our first jobs after college. We were drawn by the welcoming website after growing up with much more conservative Christianity, and by how St. Mark's clearly works (through the interfaith food bank, homeless shelter in the winter, and other avenues) to help people in San Francisco as well as worldwide. We've been welcomed by Journeys in Faith, the coffee hour, and new opportunities like the young adult ministry and intergenerational Sunday activities.



EVERY YEAR, BUT NEVER THE SAME: JOURNEYS IN FAITH

Those of you who have taken Journeys in the past can surely agree that no journey is like the other even if you have been visiting the same location.

The same is true for journeys in faith. St. Mark's Journeys in Faith team takes aspiring members and sometimes long-time members on a journey mirroring a good part of the church year and typically ending around Pentecost. The weekly meetings at 10:00AM Sunday mornings center around the scripture of the day and start with the dwelling in the word.

As members of the group reflect on the reading and share their interpretation of the meaning, the unique fabric of the group materializes, presenting new perspectives for all...even those who have read the text many times over.

This year's Journeys group was one of the largest in the last few years. Their journey started in the early days of January and continued until Pentecost. The high point of the journey was the Easter Vigil with the Baptism of Michael Peirce and the Affirmation of Faith of the other members.

This ministry intends to protect the earth's ecosystems, safeguard public health, and ensure sufficient, sustainable energy for all.

OCTOBER 8 - Justice through Faithfulness: A Re-reading of Romans - Guest Speaker - Rev. Ray Pickett Luther ignited a reformation by related relating the message of Romans to religious oppression in the context of Christendom. The theme of Romans is the revelation of God's righteousness, but in Paul's day the word the common meaning of the word that has been translated as "righteousness" was actually "justice." The first audience heard the theme was the heard the theme of the letter as the revelation of God's justice through faithfulness. In this adult forum we will explore the significance of this fresh translation of Paul's letter for our own post-Christian time.




ST. MARK'S CHRISTMAS PAGEANT WILL BE COMING SOON!

I will be mostly in NY, NJ, and PA and would be open to arranging opportunities to speak and visit as logistically possible in the interim time ahead.

I look forward to summer days in the US, and to holding Rwanda in my heart as new things unfold.

RWANDA

Traveling without a Map

At the end of June I traveled with 2 colleagues from the Lutheran Church of Rwanda to Iringa, Tanzania to celebrate the consecration of a new bishop there. Our goal was to strengthen relationships across borders with fellow Lutherans. We were an American missionary, a Tanzanian missionary in Rwanda, and a Rwandan who grew up a refugee in Tanzania. With passports in hand we crossed the Rwanda/Tanzania border and traveled far – all the way and back without a map.

Since the days of Abraham and Sarah, God has called people to travel to new places and to new experiences, and to go without a map. The biblical story testifies that God creates a way and provides bread for the journey. I have been privileged to serve in Rwanda for the past 3 ½ years, and I have often been conscious of traveling without a map in my work with the LCR and with the YAGM program. But God has provided abundantly in this time, and has opened the door to mission possibilities. I continue to be amazed and graced by the wonder of it all: strangers come together across borders of nationality, culture and language, and God's Spirit makes new things possible. I have seen young adults from the U.S. transformed by surprising friendships. I have seen LCR evangelists and pastors excited to learn and grow as Lutheran leaders. I have seen relationships growing deeper.

Last week after returning from Tanzania I began the process of saying goodbye to this place I have called home for the past few years. I will be carrying a great cloud of witnesses in my heart as I pack up and leave Rwanda to return to the US on July 17. My good-byes are to Rwandan friends and colleagues, Tanzanians, Burundians, Ugandans, Americans, Dutch, Malagasy, South Africans, Lutherans, Anglicans, Catholics, Presbyterians, and Evangelicals. These good byes are to God's people in glorious diversity but what strikes me in light of recent border crossings is that we are "no longer strangers and aliens, but citizens with the saints and members of the household of God" (Ephesians 3:19). I will miss this glimpse of God's kingdom on earth when I leave the remarkable country of Rwanda.

It has been a great privilege to serve as the first ordained missionary with the Lutheran Church of Rwanda these past few years. This work, this journey without a map has only been possible because I did not travel alone, but always with the support, guidance and prayers of so many. Thank you for your accompaniment in mission!

The current YAGMs meet for their closing retreat on July 10 and depart from Rwanda on July 13.

Mitri Raheb has left his role as pastor of the Evangelical Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem after thirty years of visionary and dedicated work throughout a challenging time for the Church and all people in the Holy Land. However, he will continue his Christian work in two ways: through academic work and his on-going leadership of Dar al-Kalima University (which he conceived and built after Israel's military invasion of Bethlehem in 2002 and continues to direct); and also by being the "Palestinian Christian prophetic voice in international gatherings, a voice that will uphold truth, proclaim liberty and defend human dignity." As Dr. Raheb declares, "The great wide world is the stage for the work of [God's] Kingdom."

We honor Rev. Raheb's tireless witness to the living Gospel and take inspiration from his words and ongoing work for our own calling and Christian service.
