#### THE GIFT OF SHOWING UP

I want to share with you what I experienced on Christmas Eve this past year. I had my "to-do" list ready in preparation for our three Christmas Eve services. There were only 3 hours before the Christmas Pageant service would begin and I had two pastoral visits to complete. These visits were with members who would not be able to be in worship for Christmas and were grieving this loss in their lives. The first visit was to a homebound member. We shared Holy Communion together and read the beloved Christmas story from the Gospel of Luke. She commented, "This is enough – I can now celebrate Christmas". We exchanged Christmas greetings and the peace of Christ before I left. She asked that I pass on greetings from her to all who would be in worship that evening.

My next visit was to a convalescent hospital to visit another member. He too would not be worshiping at St. Mark's. He received Holy Communion and he shared how good God has been to him in his life. Again, he asked that I pass on Christmas greetings to members of the congregation that he had known. After these two visits, I felt that my Christmas celebration had already begun. The depth of faith and the honest sharing of feelings were a powerful witness to me of God's incarnation and hope in the midst of difficult circumstances. Each member cherished the gift of being able to worship in community.

Later that evening, I received an e-mail from a former member of St. Mark's who had lost her home in the Paradise wildfire. She wrote, "Thank you for reaching out and for your continued prayers. My little family is doing well. Paradise Lutheran Church has been taken in by Faith Lutheran Church in Chico. It's been lovely to be so welcomed there. Both pastors have been officiating and it's been a perfect meeting spot for those of us who are scattered about the area.

We made it to our property last week. It was so sad to see our home reduced to a heap of twisted metal and gummy ash. We were able to find a few treasures – ceramics made by our daughter, a necklace, and quite a few pieces of our ceramic nativity! The new green grass is already growing on what was black scorched earth just weeks ago. . . . Merry Christmas to all our friends there at St. Mark's!!!"

Each of these individuals value their connection to St. Mark's – especially the worshipping community. In worship, we experience incarnation and resurrection in the meaningful encounters we have with one another. We receive hope from one another. We hear forgiveness and grace in our conversations with each other. We find connection in our humanity as we touch one another in the passing of the peace.

As we anticipate the Season of Lent, Holy Week and Easter, I invite you to worship with your community of faith – St. Mark's. Not everyone who yearns to be here on Sundays is able to. We may take worship for granted until we are no longer able to be present at worship. These stories remind us that it is a gift to be able to worship in community. Take this message to heart from these two members and former member. Come and worship during the Season of Lent both on Sundays and on Wednesdays at the Mid-Week services, during Holy Week and throughout the Season of Easter. Let us remember who is not able to be with us. May their witness inspire us to realize the true gift of what it means to show up for one another.

## MUSICAL OFFERINGS DURING TRIDUUM AND EASTER WORSHIP: A SAMPLER

Maundy Thursday
From Life to Life, text by Dolores Dufner, music by Petr Eben

Delores Dufner is an American sacred music composer, librettist, and organist whose works have been included in Catholic hymnals in the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom and Australia. Dufner is a nun of the Order of Saint Benedict at Saint Benedict's Monastery in Saint Joseph, Minnesota. Her lovely poem, From Life to Life, is a profound meditation on the Eucharist:

O wheat whose crushing was for bread, o bread whose breaking is for life, o life, your seeming end is seed, a seed for wheat, our bread and life.

O fruit whose crushing was for wine, o wine whose flowing is for blood, o blood, your pouring out is life, our life in you, o fruitful vine.

O life whose crushing was for love, o love whose spending was to death, o death, your mourning is our joy, full joy and birth to lasting life.

Petr Eben (1929-2007) set this poem to music in 1999. Eben was one of the most prominent Czech composers of his day. He was a devout Catholic (although his father was Jewish) and lived a life of faith forged in hardship. He was captured in 1943 and imprisoned in Buchenwald for the duration. As an adult, he refused to join the Czech Communist Party and openly continued to attend church, with great consequences to his career until 1989. After the fall of the Communist government he received several important academic appointments and cultural positions.

The Passion of Our Lord According to St. John setting by Eric Meyer (2017)

Erik Meyer (b. 1980) is an all-around musician who likes to keep busy and get his hands dirty. A native of Collingswood, New Jersey, he earned his music degrees from the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore. He is the composer of the new Johns Hopkins University school song and has won various awards for his compositions. Meyer is music director at the Church of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Philadelphia, where he oversees a large choral and instrumental program. His Passion was featured at last year's ALCM (Association of Lutheran Church Musicians) conference in Minneapolis and is very traditional in style and weaves the chorales "Herzliebster Jesu" and "Jesu meine Freude" throughout.

Easter Sunday, April 21, 2019
Dietrich Buxtehude-Heut triumphieret Gottes Sohn, BuxWV 43
George Frederich Händel - Organ Concerto in B-flat Major, Op. 4, n. 2

Scholars dispute both the year and country of Dietrich Buxtehude's birth, although most now accept that he was born in 1637 in Helsingborg, Skåne, which at the time, was a part of Denmark (but now part of Sweden). His obituary stated that "he recognized Denmark as his native country, whence he came to our region; he lived about 70 years". Dietrich was employed as an organist, first in Helsingborg (1657–1658), and then at Helsingør (1660–1668). St. Mary's in Helsingør is the only church where Buxtehude was employed that still has the organ in its original location. Buxtehude's last post, from 1668, was at the Marienkirche, Lübeck which had two organs, a large one for big services and a small one for devotionals and funerals. There he succeeded Franz Tunder and followed in many of the footsteps of his predecessor. He married Tunder's daughter Anna Margarethe in 1668 – it was not uncommon practice that a man marry the daughter of his predecessor in his occupation. Buxtehude and Anna Margarethe had seven daughters who were baptized at the Marienkirche.

His post in the free Imperial city of Lübeck afforded him considerable latitude in his musical career, and his autonomy was a model for the careers of later Baroque masters such as <u>George Frideric Handel</u>, <u>Johann Mattheson</u>, <u>Georg Philipp Telemann</u> and <u>Johann Sebastian Bach</u>. In 1673 he reorganized a series of evening musical performances, initiated by Tunder, known as <u>Abendmusik</u>, which attracted musicians from diverse places and remained a feature of the church until

1810. Buxtehude also enjoyed great fame as an organ virtuoso. In 1703, Handel and Mattheson both traveled to meet Buxtehude, who was by then elderly and ready to retire. He offered his position in Lübeck to Handel and Mattheson but stipulated that the organist who ascended to it must marry his eldest daughter, Anna Margareta. Both Handel and Mattheson turned the offer down and left the day after their arrival. In 1705, J.S. Bach, then a young man of twenty, walked from <u>Arnstadt</u> to Lübeck, a distance of more than 400 kilometres (250 mi), and stayed nearly three months to hear the Abendmusik, meet the pre-eminent Lübeck organist, hear him play, and, as Bach explained, "to comprehend one thing and another about his art".

His surviving church music (of which there are more than 100 vocal pieces) is praised for its high musical qualities rather than its progressive elements. The Marienkirche's grand gothic space was the scene of the first performances of Buxtehude's Easter Cantata, Heut triumphieret Gottes Sohn. After a brief opening movement featuring the strings of the ensemble, the piece features dueling trumpets in an opening fanfare, which are heard again in the choruses. This piece, with its exuberant exclamations of "Victoria! Victoria!" is a thrilling celebration of Christ's Joyous Resurrection.

#### NOW IS A GREAT TIME TO JOIN THE CHOIR!



#### LET'S GO TO SEMINARY

The "Let's Go to Seminary" series features four of the core faculty and one senior adjunct faculty at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary. Their teaching reflects cutting edge developments in their respective disciplines, a passion for teaching and theological education, and the innovative new curriculum being launched at PLTS. That curriculum prepares future leaders of the church for transformative ways of doing and being church that are centered in the Gospel of Jesus Christ, generate life-giving relationships and spirituality, and advance social justice and environmental well-being.

#### RELENTLESS HOPE - EXPLORING OUR BIBLICAL WITNESS IN A TIME OF DESPAIR.

We will be utilizing the book, "The Prophetic Imagination" by Dr. Walter Brueggemann, in our biblical and theological reflection during this 5-week study. This book, though written over 40 years ago, remains "one of the most perceptive uncoverings of the prophetic voice in contemporary Old Testament study."

#### March 10

This first session will be an introduction to the book and the overall themes we will be exploring. We encourage participants to read the book prior to the forum series.

#### March 17

In this session, we will explore the importance of grief and lament in our public worship and witness as Christians.

#### March 24

What does it mean to have a "prophetic consciousness"? How do we as Christians envision the world as the way God wants our world to be? Why is the message of the prophets so often threatening to the status quo? Come and explore these evocative questions and bring your questions to the conversation.

#### March 31

What, if anything, does Martin Luther have to add to our contemplations about the role of the prophetic imagination in the church? Does the theology of the cross speak to us today and help us be faithful to the gospel of Jesus in these challenging times? How do we nurture relentless hope in our own lives and in the community of St. Mark's? Come and discuss these questions and others that we raise together.

The contemporary church must ask itself: How are we to navigate our current social climate in the way of Jesus? Is social justice an integral part of our faith and practice? Why or why not? Come and explore these questions and bring your own.

#### PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT TEAM EXPLORING IDEAS FOR ULC SPACE

A team was formed in October to ascertain how our congregation can utilize the Urban Life Center (ULC) more fully, including the auditorium space. The Program Development Team members are Elise Semonian, Gerald Lundblad, Jeremy McClain, Nadine Robinson and Robert Rathmell, assisted by Pastor Ron. The team is meeting monthly to discuss potential uses and tenants that have programs consistent with our mission.

The Team began by reviewing the results of a 2015 survey regarding the future use of ULC and the "Guiding Principles" developed by the Church Council last spring regarding any future development of St. Mark's Square. We also reviewed the regular users of the ULC in order to see how the space is currently being used, and with what frequency. We considered conversations the pastors have had over the summer, primarily with service providers in the community. We have been brainstorming ideas and potential partnerships, while considering limitations of the spaces. In between our meetings, we gather information for the Team's consideration and discernment. Some promising uses include day services for seniors or the homeless, in partnership with organizations that have existing programs in San Francisco.

## RESOLUTION FOR ST. MARK'S LUTHERAN CHURCH IN SAN FRANCISCO TO BECOME A SANCTUARY CONGREGATION

Whereas we are told in Scripture, "Do not mistreat the foreigners who reside in your land. The foreigner who lives among you must be treated like one of your own. Love them as you love yourself, for you too were a foreigner in the land of Egypt. I am YHWH." (Leviticus 19: 33-34, The Inclusive Bible), and

Whereas we are also told, "Thus says YHWH Omnipotent: Administer true justice; show kindness and mercy to one another; do not oppress the widowed or the orphaned, the resident alien or the poor, and do not plot evil against one other." (Zechariah 7:9-10, The Inclusive Bible), and

Whereas we as Lutherans in the United States have been welcoming, protecting, and providing for immigrants for many years, including a partnership with Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services, and

Whereas we as members of St. Mark's voted in January 2017 to be an ELCA AMMPARO Welcoming Congregation - **A**ccompanying **M**igrant **M**inors with **P**rotection, **A**dvocacy, **R**epresentation and **O**pportunities, and

Whereas we as the congregation of St. Mark's recognize the current understanding of Sanctuary as extending activities of accompaniment, advocacy, protection, representation and opportunities to all migrants, including:

- Welcoming, praying for, and ministering to immigrants in our congregation and community;
- Identifying a contact person and team in the congregation who can communicate with and accompany immigrants and families;
- Accompanying -
  - Immigrants and their families as they regularly check in with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and immigration court;
  - Families affected by immigration, here in the San Francisco, and in our sister parish Cordero de Dios in El Salvador, and around the world.
- Advocating -
  - In protective ways for immigrants as they attempt to live and work while awaiting a decision on asylum;
  - For public policy that will positively impact the current immigration crisis, partnering with Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services and ELCA Advocacy and addressing root causes of immigration;

Be it

Resolved that St. Mark's Lutheran Church in San Francisco become a Sanctuary congregation; and be it further

Resolved that St. Mark's will join other congregations and organizations in San Francisco and the Sierra Pacific Synod in accompanying immigrants and their families, and be it further

Resolved that as a Sanctuary congregation, the current AMMPARO budget, lay leadership, and activities will be transferred to the Sanctuary ministry for accompaniment and advocacy for migrant children and adults. **Passed (Yes - 70; No - 11).**


#### THANK YOU LARRY!

#### ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

St. Mark's held its annual congregational meeting on Sunday, January 27. Some of the meeting highlights were:

- The congregation approved the 2019 budget. The budget includes a 3% cost of living increase for all of St. Mark's staff and a 1% merit increase for Pastoral staff in keeping with synod guidelines. Income from building use as well as general envelope giving has increased in 2019; all ministry teams have been fully funded as requested.
- A report from Treasurer Steve Ernst about our 2018 income and expenses: 2018 came in on budget. General envelope giving was as estimated at \$460,000 and was realized and income from building use increased in 2018. 2018 income was \$739, 241. Total expenditures were \$765, 757. The shortfall was anticipated and covered by the Contingency Reserves.



- Mary Ritter, Sanctuary Task Force chair led an in-depth discussion with the congregation about what it means for St. Mark's Lutheran Church to become a Sanctuary Congregation and addressed concerns. These efforts will include AMMPARO with a broader scope. Members of the Sanctuary Task Force supported the discussion points: Laura Evenson, Kimberly Hamilton-Lam, Jason Jennings, Pastor Ron Moe-Lobeda and Cora Rose.
- The congregation approved the resolution for St. Mark's Lutheran Church in San Francisco to become a Sanctuary Congregation. (Yes 70; No 11).
- In addition to his printed report, Pastor Moe-Lobeda spoke of his work on the Outreach Team as well as on The Program Development Team established to determine the best use of the Urban Life Center to utilize the ULC to provide services for seniors, children or the homeless. He urges the congregation to invite a friend to service and also invite someone to return to St. Mark's who has not attended lately and let them know they are missed.
- In addition to her printed report, Pastor Ekdale spoke of her continued Governance work, with the Task Force to improve and define the working relationship of St. Mark's Lutheran Church (SMLC) with Martin Luther Tower (MLT). She also highlighted the many opportunities to strengthen our faith and invites the congregation to attend one of the many 10:00 am adult forums. She spoke of the 3 Goals and 3 Open Questions established by Council during their fall retreat and welcomes more conversation with the congregation throughout the year. Appreciation was also expressed for the diligent work of the Sanctuary Task Force throughout this year.
- Report from St. Mark's Council President Mark Semonian included a thank you to all St. Mark's staff and special thank you to Steve Ernst and Omer Voss for their many hours of dedication as they complete their current terms. A special thank you was also expressed to the co-chairs of the successful 3-year Capital Campaign: Greg Jahnke and Roger Ostrem.
- Report from MLT by Voss, Board President provided an update on the many upgrades to the tower this year: renovations of both elevators, plans for new windows and improved senior programming. MLT also plans for re-syndication, "a new mortgage" Voss states that will help provide funding to continue affordable housing, programming for seniors and support to SMLC. MLT also provided a \$250,000 grant to SMLC for the Capital Campaign in 2018.
- Report on St. Mark's Square development by Jeff Kohler: efforts continue and are on a positive path. All development plans support the mission and ministries of SMLC. Development will include mixed use spaces, some examples provided: local retail, community health offices, non-profit offices, St. Mark's offices and ministry partners, day care and some portion affordable housing.
- Election of incumbent Council Members: Nadine Robinson and Matthias Will for 3-year terms, and new member, Emma Gray, youth Council Member for a 3-year term.





#### **COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS: FALL/WINTER 2018**

- Please visit the council bulletin board (across from the nursery) to read the approved Council minutes. New postings added toward the end of each month.
- We look forward to welcoming Emma Grey, youth member, to council in 2019.
- Council recommends a balanced 2019 budget to the Congregation for the Annual meeting as well as a recommendation to become a Sanctuary Congregation.
- Council continues work on a Guiding Principles document and provides support to and conversation with the St. Mark's Square Development Committee.
- Council approved a 2018 fall Audit Review committee to review St. Mark's financial processes that has been completed. Council sincerely thanks Tapio Boles, Rick Seefeldt and Shelly Taylor for their talented work on the audit review committee. Our Finance Committee will address the recommendations from this review.
- Council welcomes Sonja Pilman, our new intern, and supports her during her shared internship experience with St. Andrews Lutheran Church.
- Council diligently prepares for our 2019 Annual meeting and looks forward to conversation throughout 2019 about our mission goals and open questions.

- Check with friends and family who may need assistance, especially older adults and physically challenged;
- Remove debris and sweep up any leaves from sidewalks and storm drains:
- Call 311 for non-life threatening storm issues and 911 for all other emergencies
- Sign up for AlertSF by texting your Zip Code to 888-777 for emergency alerts
- If power goes out, unplug and turn off appliances. Leave one light on to signal when power is restored;
- Avoid using candles because they are a fire hazard;
- Have extra flashlights and extra batteries on hand;
- Stay away from flooded areas and downed power lines in car or on foot;
- Do not touch electrical equipment if you are wet or standing in water;
- Tune to KCBS (740 AM or 106.9 FM) and other media for advisories and instructions, and visit <a href="www.sf72.org/em/home">www.sf72.org/em/home</a> for additional weather information.
