### ORDINARY DAYS FOR EXTRAORDINARY PEOPLE OF GOD

Acts 2:42-47

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home, and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

After Pentecost Sunday, which we celebrated on May 15th, there will be 23 Sundays after Pentecost before we commemorate Reformation Sunday. This is the longest season of the Church Calendar. It goes through the whole summer, the "quiet times" not only in the church but perhaps even in our lives. It seems like Sabbath is real during this time – people are intentional about renewal, rest

and reflection. This season is also called the second Ordinary Time (the first period is after the Baptism of our Lord to Ash Wednesday) referring to the ordinary form of the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church. The United Methodist Church also refers to it is 'Kingdomtide." Though quieter, we, as a church, should pay attention to this period even amidst the distraction of vacations, retreats, and rests. Ordinary times are not really ordinary times after all. We will be reminded about the powerful movement of the Holy Spirit in and through the church and the world.

Some say that Lutherans do not lift up the work of the Holy Spirit much, which sometimes nowadays only referring to the Charismatic movement. This movement is a global phenomenon and even us, Lutheran Christians, are a part of it. But the movement of the Spirit is not just about how we worship – singing loud, energetic and passionate music, moving our body, allowing oneself to spontaneous prayer or praise. This the reason why the book of Acts is not about these things; though it started in this simple post-Pentecost Day gathering (Acts 2:42-47) that showed the work of the Holy Spirit's work among the first church – their struggles, joy and passion. It seemed to be a simple gathering – but the power of the Holy Spirit cannot be contained neither expressed with our action alone. Deborah Butler Bass centered her book "Christianity after Religion" on the emerging spiritual awakening happening all around us. She said, "This awakening, however, is rather different than those in the past. Not an evangelical event, not based in traditional revivalism, this Great Awakening can be discovered in all faith communities in a new quest for experiential faith. In order to understand what is happening in American religion, we need to see in new ways."

The book of Acts is still being written and we, the St. Mark's community, is included among those writing its continuation. So how could we catch on the fire of the Spirit even in our intentional renewal, rest and reflection? What do we need to do to be able to "see in new ways"? Remember, the Holy Spirit dwells and moves in and through us. May we respond in awe of her power so that we can be instruments for love and service, and see things in new ways. Amen.



The 2015 indie film "Meet the Patels" follows Ravi's search for a life partner, as chronicled by his sister (and co-director) Geeta Patel. In essence, this is the stage that your Call Committee has reached toward calling an associate pastor.

Our first task was to get to know each other and our history with St. Mark's. Then we turned to discerning, together, who God wants us to be, and what type of leader can help us become everything we are called to be. We now have completed the first tangible step in the call process: developing a Ministry Site Profile.

Like Ravi's bio-data, this document will be published for candidates all over the country to view. Unlike Ravi's one-pager, the ministry site profile is eleven pages long, plus attachments. The MSP is St. Mark's chance to explain who are and who we hope to become, including congregation and community demographics, our giftedness, and the challenges we perceive in living out our vision for the future.

After many meetings, prayerful consideration, and focused exercises, we submitted the MSP to the congregational council. The council provided feedback, and approved the profile at their April meeting.

Now the MSP goes out from the congregation to the Sierra Pacific Synod, where the office of the Bishop will review it before publishing it for candidates open to call.

We are grateful to have the Synod as a partner as we move forward in calling our next associate pastor. We are "church together" and will benefit from the Synod staffs' wisdom, experience, and objective view during this Spirit-led matchmaking process.

We are also grateful for the prayers and support of you, the congregation! We are your Call Committee. Please talk to us about your vision for the congregation and the associate pastor's ministry among us and on our behalf. We are: Gretchen Armstrong, Pr. She told of conversation with the YAGMs as they considered their time in Rwanda. "Pilgrimage was a theme as we considered the difference between being a tourist and a pilgrim. A tourist has new experience, but remains the same person. A pilgrim experiences new places and is transformed by them."

## RESTORING ST. MARK'S ART GLASS

We are already receiving the fruits of the 2016-2018 Capital Campaign. St. Mark's entered a contract with the Santa Clara company Hyland Studio to restore the art glass throughout the church building. Workers have already removed, restored and reinstalled the rosette window and the window at the back of the east side of the building, and removed the window at the backside of the west side.

While at the studio, workers:

- Take a rubbing of the window, get exact measurements and document its condition
- Disassemble the window and remove all lead
- Soak and clean all glass
- Determine if any glass must be replaced
- Rebuild the window using all new lead in the matrix and borders
- Add brace bars as needed
- Apply putty-resin to both sides to weather proof and secure glass in the lead
- Rub and brush the lead to remove shine
- Thoroughly clean both sides of the window
- Package the window for transport.

The planned schedule is for each window to take 5 weeks to restore and I week to reinstall. Following this schedule, we expect to complete the work in August 2017, which is well under the 2-year commitment to receive a 5% discount on the entire contract. The Floors, Elevator and Windows (FEW) Committee and our

Congregational Council are tracking progress to assure the work will be completed in time to get the discount.

## CAPITAL CAMPAIGN News

We indeed are living our capital campaign, "Forward in Faith... lifted by love" as we can see progress begin in the sanctuary with the replacement of our stained glass windows. Many members and friends of the congregation have generously supported the capital campaign project with their financial pledges of support. The most recent accounting indicates that \$965,859 has been pledged to the capital campaign from 98 pledges received from 51% of the congregation households. A total of \$387,350 has been pledged to the general fund from 112 pledges received from 58% of the congregation. U.S. And Palestinian Religious Leaders Convene at Summit Meeting on Palestine :

A Call to Action for All Faith Communities-April 2016

More than 100 top leaders of U.S. and Palestinian churches and religious communities met at the Carter Center in Atlanta, Georgia in April to urge a renewed and vigorous pursuit of peace, advocacy efforts in the U.S. and the strengthening of Christian presence in the Holy Land. This unprecedented "Atlanta Summit of American and Palestinian Churches" called attention to the urgency of the on-going lack of peace in the area, and the injustices toward Palestinians that have resulted in the continuing decline of the Christian population under the current Israeli military occupation of Palestine for more than five decades.

The "Atlanta Summit Document" produced at the meeting called for more effective advocacy in the U.S. for peace and justice in the Holy Land; and to that end, more education of our congregations regarding the peace process and the rights of all people in the region. The leaders acknowledged the dedicated work of some Christian, Jewish and Muslims involved in addressing humanitarian needs and working for peace; and designated a common day of prayer and reflections across U.S. churches and the Holy Land.

Top Lutherans took active roles in the Summit: ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, Palestinian Bishop Munib Younan (President of the Lutheran World Federation and Bishop of the ELC of Jordan and the Holy Land ) and Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb (Pastor of Christmas Lutheran Church, Bethlehem, Palestine) participated alongside Catholic, Orthodox, Eastern Orthodox, mainline Protestant and historic African American and Latino churches. Bishop Eaton praised the broad spectrum of participants, stating, "The freedom of Palestine, the security of the state of Israel and the preservation of Arab Christianity in the Holy Land are not political issues for a few but a faith issue for many."

A conference delegation then delivered the Summit document to the White House, together with a letter to President Obama. The delegation (including Bishops Eaton and Younan; the Latin patriarch of Jerusalem; the Episcopalian archbishop of Jerusalem; and several other Palestinians) met with President Obama's top level assistants for the area, stressing the importance of education in the Holy Land, the need to fight extremism and radicalism, and Jerusalem's centrality to the peace process.

Our churches are now called to realize the goals set by our religious leaders in Atlanta, working together to achieve peace and justice in the Holy Land.

At 9am, everyone began the retreat with spiritual centering time in the Sanctuary – inspirational hymns and prayers, Tim Zerling's wonderful music, and reflection led by Pastor Ekdale.

The group reassembled in Heritage Hall for Barbara Engmann's welcome and introduction to the day. Jeff set the tone for the day, reviewing written statements of the Missions and Ministries of St. Mark's and the MLT Corporation and reminding everyone of the history of The Square. He led the group as they shared thoughts about "Vision for The Square" and its current and future uses. Then, he and Paul taught the group in understandable terms about tax-credit financing, how it was applied to MLT to enable St. Mark's retrofit, and upcoming financing requirements.

Jon Moeller followed with an update on plans for development and led a detailed discussion of the potential opportunity for a new building. Continuing the agenda, the group learned about each organization's financial structures, resources, and challenges.

Before ending the retreat, the group thanked Jeff, Paul, and the planning team, along with Chiara and Stefani, for their work on this successful event. Everyone agreed on the value and importance of this gathering, decided enthusiastically to meet again for more details on several topics, and looked forward to future coordination of the two teams' activities and strategic initiatives.

We are fortunate to have such a collegial group of talented volunteers serving together for the betterment of St. Mark's, MLT, and our greater community.



## St. Mark's Square Development update

About four years ago we formed our development committee to explore potentially adding affordable housing to St. Mark's Square to enhance Christ's mission to our fellow San Francisco residents and to update our own facilities and security. The development committee is comprised of members of both the St. Mark's Council and MLT board and the group, along with our advisors, selected prominent local development partners: The John Stewart Company (aka JSCo, which also manages MLT for us) and Chinatown Community Development Corporation ("CCDC"). Both groups have significant experience developing and managing affordable housing in San Francisco.

The typical financing route for affordable housing is through the City of San Francisco, however other priorities emerged about three years ago which left little funding for affordable housing. Some of that changed after the November, 2015 election and potential city funding is currently available, in a competitive process. Our development partners advised us there may not be another opportunity for quite some time and they are preparing a response.

We do expect the city to receive more responses than they can fund. The responses are due in July and we may know more later in the Summer.
