

On Pentecost Sunday, five young people will be affirming the baptismal vows that their parents made on their behalf when they were much younger. Appropriate to this day of Pentecost when about 3,000 people originally were baptized and added to the community of disciples who had witnessed the death and resurrection of Jesus, we all will be reaffirming our baptism along with these confirmands and re-committing ourselves to follow in the way of Jesus. Therefore, we all will be asked if we intend to continue in the covenant that God made with us in our baptism:

- To live among God's faithful people;
- To hear the Word of God and share in the Lord's supper;
- To proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed;
- To serve all people, following the example of Jesus; and
- To strive for justice and peace in all the earth.




**To live among God's faithful people** is to be a member of a community of faith where everyone is welcome and has a sense of belonging. This community is meant to be a safe place where differing points of view can be expressed and are accepted without causing divisiveness within the community. This mutual sharing will not be without conflict because we all will never agree totally on everything. However, with the commitment to listen to one another, to respect one another, and to see through the lens of the other person, we can grow in our understanding of each other and experience the community that is a gift of God in our baptism.

To hear the Word of God and share in the Lord's Supper are the bedrock of our community. The Word comforts those who are afflicted and afflicts those who are too comfortable in their way of life. The Word also is meant to be a dialogue in which the Spirit speaks in and through each of us in order that we may grow in our understanding of God's will for our individual and corporate life. Sharing in Holy Communion is meant to unite us in our community so that whatever differences, disagreements, or disparities may divide us, we can draw upon the unifying strength of this holy meal to claim that we still are one in Jesus Christ.

To proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed not only includes the words that we speak, but also the acts that we perform that reflect the love of God as revealed in Christ Jesus and the justice that God requires of all who have been baptized in Jesus' name. Sometimes our actions speak so much louder than our words, especially when we act together in speaking out on behalf of those who are impoverished, oppressed, or violated in any way, or in making peace with those who have done us wrong.

To serve all people, following the example of Jesus is a lofty expectation, but one to which we all are called to aspire in our baptism. After giving thanks to God at the start of each new day and dwelling in the power of the Holy Spirit, we can ask ourselves, "How will I be faithful to the testimony and witness of Jesus today in every encounter that I have with another human being (not to mention with all of God's creation)?" If this question is front-and-center in our daily lives, we always will know that we are not far from the realm of God.

To strive for justice and peace in all the earth completes the circle of what it means to be a baptized child of God in this world. Imagine what the earth would be like today if all who were baptized in Jesus' name would take this promise to heart! All that we can do is do our part to fulfill God's desire and design for this wonderful creation in which we all could live together in God's justice and peace that would be the foundation of the beloved community revealed to us in Jesus, our Christ.

# PENTECOST SUNDAY - JUNE 4

Pentecost Sunday is one of the three most important festivals of the church year—the day when we celebrate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Jesus' disciples and the gathering of these early disciples into a communal body that we acknowledge as the body of Christ. As we gather for worship this day, along with rejoicing with the 5 young people who will be affirming their faith, we will be giving thanks to God for the presence and power of the Spirit in our lives, both corporately and individually. As a way of celebrating this day, everyone is encouraged to wear something red to symbolize the fire of the Spirit that burns in our lives to nourish our faith and encourage us in our faithfulness as disciples of Jesus, our Christ.

# **CONFIRMATION - JUNE 4**

We celebrate with five young people as they affirm their faith on Sunday, June 4 at the 11:00 a.m. worship service. They are: Signe Bohlig, Emma Gray, Grace Ekdale-Hoch, Tayte Sall, and Evan Schieber. These young people have participated in our confirmation ministry for 3 years, and have weathered the transition of leaders and teachers during this time period. As they commit themselves to continue in the covenant that God made with them in their baptism, we pray that their trust in God will remain strong and that they will remain confident in their faithfulness to the way that Jesus has revealed to them by the power of the Holy Spirit. St. Mark's received our Welcome packet from the national ELCA AMMPARO office in mid-April. It's official! After months of discernment and education that culminated in our January 2017 annual meeting, our congregation is now on the roster of Welcoming Congregations in the ELCA.

We previously highlighted 7 possible areas of Welcoming Congregations activity under the ambit of Accompanying, Protection, Advocacy, Representation, and Opportunities (those are the A, P, A, R, and O in AMMPARO). Now we get to discern how we want our congregation's participation to take shape. It's time to **Inform, Identify, and Implement**!

We've been **Inform**ing ourselves about how St. Mark's can plug into work already happening here in the Bay Area and with mission partners. To that end, St. Mark's AMMPARO team leaders have been building relationships with Lutheran and interfaith ministry partners doing advocacy work in this area.

Now it's time for information about where St. Mark's members feel the Spirit's leading to get involved! Do we want to:

- Take a border immersion service trip
- Visit immigration court to learn and to support asylum-seekers
- Join interfaith actions and protests
- Write letters to policy-makers
- Assemble hygiene kits for border ministries
- Serve as overnight hosts for asylum-seekers traveling to San Francisco for court dates

We get to decide together - you tell us where you, your family, your ministry group wants to get involved. What excites you? How can you serve?

It's also time to **Identify** project captains for different areas of activity. We need someone to step forward to regularly uphold migrant minors and other asylum-seekers in the Prayers of the People. We also need a project captain for each of the activities we decide to undertake.

And then it will be time to **Implement** the projects the congregation wants to get involved in!

### Ways You Can Get Involved Right Now

1) Pray for migrant minors and asylum-seekers. Here is a prayer to help you get started:

Gracious God, we remember all who come to America as refugees, especially children separated from their families. Lead them to safe homes, that they might live in peace and be reunited with loved ones. Please strengthen churches, agencies and individuals that serve vulnerable newcomers. Give them wisdom, patience, perseverance and love to minister effectively. Amen!

- **4)** Discern where your gifts and interests align in support of the unaccompanied minor and asylum-seeker crisis, and be bold about letting us know!

# CAPITAL CAMPAIGN PLEDGE UPDATE

Pledges/Gifts/Bequests \$1,082,554

**Amount Received To-Date** \$624,163

Campaign Pledge Status Ahead of Schedule



As of May 1, 2017, St. Mark's capital campaign is 16 months into its 36 month commitment period. This time period represents 44% of the total pledge commitment period. In order to be considered on schedule, cash receipts to date should hopefully also total 44%. Actual cash receipts to date currently total 58%. Although campaign receipts are off to a very good start, this ahead-of-schedule status is due primarily to several large gifts and/or donations received up front or early in the pledge period. ifted by love<sup>2</sup> If focus is directed to individual members/friends pledging results, cash receipts total 33%, which is short of the expected 44%. The

shortfall in members/friends pledging receipts is likely due to some pledges being made on an annual basis rather than a weekly or monthly basis. The most precise accounting of pledge activity will therefore occur at year-end.

Very good progress has been made on our three capital projects: (1) the installation of new hardwood floors in the sanctuary has been completed, (2) the repair and restoration of stained glass windows in the sanctuary is nearing completion, and (3) the installation of an elevator has begun.

Thank you to all of the members and friends of St. Mark's who have made a personal pledge of support to this worthwhile project. Your pledge of support is helping to make this project a reality. If you have not made a pledge to the capital campaign, our committee encourages you to prayerfully consider doing so. The capital campaign is a three-year campaign with 20 months remaining. All pledges, whether large or small, are much needed and greatly appreciated. # **NEWS FROM MARTIN LUTHER TOWER**

On March 21 we held our annual meeting of the MLT Corporation. The Corporation consists of the members of the Martin Luther Tower Board and the members of St. Mark's Council. JoAnne Chadwick, Jon Moeller, and Omer Voss were re-elected to the MLT Board, and Kimberley Hamilton-Lam was elected to the Board. During 2016 the Board held two retreats with the Church Council, completed several upgrades and renovations, passed all property inspections, managed staff transitions while maintaining 99% occupancy, and fulfilled its \$250,000 pledge to the "Forward in Faith" capital campaign at St. Mark's. MLT officers were elected at the Board meeting following the Corporation meeting – Omer Voss, President; Barbara Engmann Vice-President; Jerry Lundblad, Treasurer; Barbara Bock, Secretary.



We are looking forward to beginning the replacement of our 50-year old elevators and replacing the oft-patched ULC roof. A recent accomplishment was the replacement of the worn chairs in Ben Brockie Lounge in the MLT building. A resident committee worked with Property Manager Ian O'Leary to find the best possible chair for the space.

# SIERRA PACIFIC SYNOD ASSEMBLY HIGHLIGHTS May 4th - May 6th, 2017, Fresno, CA

The Sierra Pacific Synod met in Assembly for the thirtieth time under the theme "We Are Church Together: Telling Our Story". The Assembly opened with a worship service with Synod Bishop Mark Holmerud delivering the sermon. St. Mark's members who attended (voting members) were Jane Borg, Pr. Elizabeth Ekdale, Steve Ernst, Margaret McLean and Pr. Ron Moe-Lobeda. Also in attendance were (non-voting members) Mary Ritter and Nadine Robinson (representing WELCA).

Of the 506 individuals registered at the Assembly, 417 were voting members and 89 were visitors.

Of the voting members, 61.63% were Lay members and 33.37% were Clergy. 47.24% were Male, 50.60% were Female and 2.16% did not define their gender. 7.91% of the registered members identified themselves as persons of color or non-English speaking persons.

Keynote addresses were presented by The Rev. Dr. David Vasquez-Levy, President of the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley. Dr. Ryan Cumming, Director of Education with ELCA World Hunger,

presented the Bible
Studies. As an outgo-

ing ELCA Church Council member,

St. Mark's Pastor Elizabeth Ekdale, addressed the Assembly prior to her introduction of The Rev. Wyvetta Bullock, Assistant to ELCA Presiding Bishop Eaton. Rev. Bullock delivered the ELCA Churchwide Report. Providing music for the Assembly was Jonathan Rundman, who participated at St. Mark's on Reformation Sunday worship service. On Saturday, we celebrated Cinco de Mayo, appropriately, with a Mexican dinner and Folklorico and Aztec Dancers from the Fresno area.



We heard the reports from 10 congregations that had received grants last year from the Valley Coalition Mission Fund to represent Christ in new ways to the communities that they serve.

The congregations were asked to return this year to tell their stories of how the grants helped them connect to the communities that they serve.

At this Assembly: Three Resolutions were presented for consideration and were voted upon:

- #2017-1: Regarding the SPS 2017-2018 Compensation Guidelines for Rostered Ministers - AMENDED AND PASSED
- #2017-2: Regarding the SPS declaring itself to be a Sanctuary Synod - PASSED
- #2017-3: Regarding the SPS and the ELCA supporting the creation of a Department of Peacebuilding - PASSED

Dominant topics addressed throughout this Assembly were Racial Justice; AMMPARO; Sanctuary (at all levels - ELCA, Synod and Congregation) Faith, Sexism and Justice; Peace Building; and Reconciling-In-Christ.

# GREETINGS FROM PR. KATE WARN

Greetings of grace and peace in this holy season.

I am writing from Kigali on a rainy Palm Sunday afternoon, in the early days of a week devoted to remembrance of the Rwandan genocide. Commemoration day in Rwanda (April 7), and commemoration week (through the 14th) are colored by deep sorrow as well as hope in these days. It has been 23 years since the Genocide began the Tuesday after Easter in 1994. Not surprisingly, this season tends to be somber here, but this year there is a stronger sense of movement to the promise of Easter life as the days of commemoration overlap with holy week. Rwanda lives between memory and hope, and the nation continues to offer many lessons of faith and fortitude and forgiveness.

As you will see in my newsletter this is a season of change in my own life, as I am beginning to prepare for a permanent return to the US. This is a bittersweet announcement as good things are happening in my work with the Lutheran Church of Rwanda, and the roots of YAGM are beginning to bear fruit. But after some months of discernment, I am finding myself living in God's time once again, trusting that this is the right time to move closer to family and to engage in mission amidst the challenges of US life. A new ELCA missionary for Rwanda has been with me for the past few weeks for initial orientation and learning. Rev. Janelle Neubauer will move to Rwanda permanently in May to begin her ministry as YAGM Rwanda country coordinator, and I will wrap up my time here with the completion of the current YAGM year in July.

There will be more to say as July draws near. I live with gratitude that global mission has taught me what it means to be a part of a world wide community of disciples who share faith in word and deed, prayer and other expressions of support. As is so often said in Rwanda: "turi kumwe." We are together -- to the glory of God. n peace, Kate

# RWANDA



In my work with the Lutheran Church of Rwanda this is also a season of new growth and life. After many months of planning, waiting and working with colleagues, we have started a new program of theological education and leadership development for pastors, evangelists, and other leaders of the church. The LCR has struggled for many years to raise up and train leaders. Many of the current pastors have minimal formal education and limited theological training. An understanding of Lutheran identity is particularly weak. In March, pastors gathered to explore themes of Lutheran identity and we hope this will be the first in an ongoing series of workshops for the church's ordained leaders.

This past week we also held the first session in a three year training program for LCR evangelists. Evangelists are the lay people who run congregations on a day to day basis and they are key to the life of the church. Earlier this week, I joined 2 LCR pastors in teaching themes of Lutheranism to 16 eager and engaged evangelists. I greatly enjoyed the chance to teach and answer questions raised by the evangelists (who struggle in this context heavily influenced by the prosperity gospel and Pentecostalism). There is an eagerness to learn among my colleagues here and I rejoice to see a new generation of leaders committed to serving the Lutheran Church of Rwanda. These new educational opportunities are made possible with the financial support of the ELCA and I am grateful for the ways we have been able to work together in mission.

# To everything there is a season...

It is the rainy season now in Rwanda, with frequent and lengthy rain showers, at least in Kigali. Last year's rains were sparse throughout the country, and in past months I have heard many stories of poor harvests, high prices for staple foods, and consequent hunger. Farmers are hoping for good rains in coming weeks and a better harvest this season.

In a land with tin roofs on most buildings, the sound of rain falling is often quite loud. Heavy rains, however, are a good occasion for taking a song and dance break, as seen in the photo on the left. Below are women from the LCR and Rev. Andrea Walker of ELCA Global Mission.




# ...and a time for every purpose under heaven.

# PEACE - AND JUSTICE - NOT WALLS FOR BETHLEHEM AND ALL OF PALESTINE AND ISRAEL - MESSAGE FROM HOLY LAND MINISTRY

Last December St. Mark's hosted PALESTINE: UNLIMITED, the photography exhibit from Dar Al-Kalima University which portrayed the hopes and realities of young Palestinians who have lived under Israeli military occupation for their whole lives, yearning for fuller lives not restricted by Separation Walls and military omni-presence. This situation has not changed; it has worsened, and worsens steadily in Palestine, with home demolitions, land confiscation, and increasing economic hardships and human struggles. And the Christian population in Israel-Palestine, already drastically reduced, is being forced out even from Bethlehem, birthplace of Jesus, by the continuing Israeli occupation. www.brightstarsbethlehem.org

In April the film OPEN BETHLEHEM powerfully revealed the construction of the Wall around Bethlehem starting in 2002 with the invasion of Bethlehem and its consequences. St. Mark's was one of several co-sponsors of the film, shown at Grace Cathedral, St. John's Presbyterian Church and Charlie's Cafe in Bernal Heights. The film brought home to viewers an understanding of the oppressive human effects of the fortified Wall surrounding Bethlehem (or any place - we should pay attention also in California as a "Security Wall" is being contemplated on our southern border). www. openbethlehem.org

However, the talented filmmaker Leila Sansour also demonstrated through her film the remarkable and peaceful resistance of Palestinians to their oppression, as they organized to screen the film internationally, beginning in London, then Canada and now the United States. Like the Kairos Palestine Document of 2009, or the film 'The Stones Cry Out", or the BDS (Boycott, Divest and Sanction) movement - OPEN BETHLEHEM calls upon viewers to advocate for Palestinian rights and justice. Without significant change, the Christian presence in Israel-Palestine will be reduced to only church structures - bereft of Christians, who are the "living stones" witnessing to God's love and working toward God's justice and peace amidst the conflicts of that land.

ELCA calls us to ADVOCACY for many crucial issues. Pray, yes; learn, yes; and take some action - advocate for changes, for peace, for justice! Write letters or call decision-makers - in Congress and elsewhere - to demand and support justice. As a Christian advocate for Palestine, ask - and keep asking - those in power to OPEN BETHLEHEM and all of Palestine; take down the Walls that separate people and propagate fear and distrust on both sides. Contribute to the hospitals serving Palestinians: Augusta Victoria Hospital in Jerusalem, founded by Lutheran World Federation. Support the schools with scholarships, e.g. Dar Al-Kalima University in Bethlehem and four Lutheran elementary schools in Palestine and Jordan.
