God will clothe us with garments of salvation. God will liberate us from all of our enemies. God is our strength. Nothing will be impossible with God.

As we begin our journey through this new church year and assess all that is going on in our country in relationship to the world in which

we live, more than ever, we could use some words and images of hope. This season we are reminded that no matter how depressing or despairing our context may be, with God nothing is impossible in terms of God's Spirit continually moving us toward a world where God's love abounds, God's justice is a high priority, and God's way of peace is foremost on everyone's heart and mind.

There is plenty of reason to rejoice in this season because we also are reminded that Jesus came in the flesh to reveal this way of God's love, justice, and peace in all of its fullness. The challenge for all of us in this season of Advent is to explore the ways that we could be a greater reflection of this way of Jesus beyond what we already may be doing to spread God's love, pursue God's justice, or seek God's peace in this turbulent and hostile world. We obviously have a lot of competition in this regard as we try to figure out what to buy for whom, how many holiday parties to attend, and where to go to escape the loneliness of this season.

None of us has to look very far to find an opportunity to make the connection between what God in Christ has done for us and what we might be able to do for others. As the prophet Isaiah suggests, there is so much yet to be done in bringing good news to those who are oppressed, binding up the brokenhearted, proclaiming liberty to those who are captive, releasing prisoners from their bondage, comforting those who mourn, and repairing the ruined cities that are plagued with so much homelessness, hunger, poverty, and violence. We can become so overwhelmed by this plight of our society that all that we may want to do is escape into the safe harbor of merriment and wassail revelry.

Not to worry, because God is patient with us and God is the One who will "bring about the obedience of faith" in us so that we might become more faithful in our response to all of the travesties and hostilities that surround us. Herein lays our hope. As we celebrate the birth of Jesus once again, we are reminded that we are a people of peace and good will to all peoples and all nations, and that we are not alone in this ministry because Jesus has come to be with us forever and has baptized us with the Holy Spirit to inspire and empower us with every spiritual gift to fulfill the year of God's favor in the year 2018.

This story at the beginning of the Hebrew Scriptures probably is one of the most used, and sometimes abused, stories in the entire Bible. For over 20 years, Pastor Ron delved into various interpretations of this story without satisfaction. As 2017 draws to a close, we are excited to report that the FEW (Floors, Elevator & Windows) projects are nearly complete!

- St. Mark's members and visitors have enjoyed the new oak flooring for over a year. The beautiful wood and its acoustical enhancement of our worship space are still thrilling with every visit!
- Although the project has taken longer than expected, the elevator is nearly finished as this issue of The Voice is published. Following the review and approval of the State Elevator Inspector in early December, the elevator should be ready for use in time for the holiday season, providing access for all people to each floor level of our landmark building.
- The restoration of our historic windows is nearly complete! The project should come to a close in early 2018 when the last windows are removed, rebuilt with new lead cames and reinstalled. We have enjoyed the shimmering results of each rebuilt window as the work progressed this past year and a half.

These significant projects will improve and enhance the experience of St. Mark's members and guests for generations to come and would not have been possible without the generous gifts of St. Mark's members and friends. Even so, we still have a great distance to go before these improvements are fully funded. We hope that you will recognize the value of the FEW projects and consider additional gifts as 2017 concludes and 2018 begins.

It also is rewarding to hear comments from concert goers, and members of the congregation, that the exterior façade for the elevator looks like it has always been part of the church's design. CONFIRMATION

SMLC COUNCIL AND MLT BOARD JOINT RETREAT



Dan Hotchkiss will facilitate this discussion and guide our leaders toward a coordinated effort of embodying and implementing the mission of St. Mark's.

ST. MARK'S VISITS OUR SISTER PARISH CORDERO DE DIOS

"Pasa por aqui, Pasa por aqui," sing Clarke, Ryan, and Linnea from Gate 15 at the San Salvador Airport. These three St. Mark's youngsters are singing a favorite refrain from our worship this week as our delegation concludes another meaningful, relationship-strengthening visit with our sister parish Cordero de Dios.

Our trip included many highlights, such as a spontaneous visit with Bishop Medardo Gomez from the Salvadoran Lutheran Church, who talked about IPAZ, an initiative for peace in El Salvador. In addition to the Bishop, we met with two former gang members and three community leaders. They urged us to share their struggle for peace with our communities in the United States, and pleaded for solidarity in these times. They are organizing a march to urge rival groups to seek peace this advent season.

We spent time at Cordero de Dios talking in small groups with parishioners, playing some casual soccer games, and leading a hand loom weaving workshop. The youth were so enthralled with the hand loom project, they plan to make hats and scarves for cancer patients at a local hospital using their beautiful yarns donated by the St. Mark's knitters and the new looms pur-





On Thanksgiving, we visited a community near the border of Guatemala along with an ELCA Global Mission team who were there to follow-up on a microloan program for Salvadorans deported from the US. There is a stigma for deportees and it can be hard for them to find jobs, so these loans helped a fisherman, beautician, and shop keeper to get started with their businesses.

The Cordero de Dios community still mourns the loss of our dear Pastor Norma, and her husband Pastor Rafael is leading the community with passion and purpose. We shed tears together with community members fighting serious illnesses, and renewed our interest in coupling our accompaniment with some financial support for specific medical needs.

There are a hundred more stories we could share. If you are able to connect with Pastor Ron, Liv, Aaron, Ryan, Allana, Matt, Clarke, Linnea, or Mary, here are some prompts you can ask us about: sharing the prayer shawls and squares, "Flora for Mayor," reinterpreting the story of Christ's birth as a modern-day migration story, a floating paper lantern, the arduous path to the lookout point, our delicious breakfasts, splashing around in a pool, painting crosses with Christian at Casa Magnolia, encouraging scholarship students from across El Salvador at a rally, the children's journals, Pastor Brian's open-door policy, giving an olive wood nativity from Claire Anastase and St. Mark's, and the long bumpy road to Cara Sucia.

We've received a very clear invitation to come back next year. The congregation made it clear that they missed us last year, and urged us to continue our visits. If you are interested in being part of a delegation during Thanksgiving week 2018, let the Hellands know.
